#### **Literature Review:**

- Preeti Singh and Annu Pandy(2005) In this paper they showed that survey of 100 women employees in all centers and described the women situations and problems faced by them. They examine the situation of working women in night shifts and adverse effect of night shift work on the women health. The women faced also many adverse effect on family life because of this job but many part of country accept this non-traditional job ignore all adverse effects.
- Raghunath (2012) in his work titled as "Mental Health of Middle Aged Working Women" described the mental health situation of middle aged working women. In this study Ragunath take 60 sample size of women and showed that 92% of middle aged working women are facing mental health related problems. In the middle age many problems brings like fear, tension, loss of memory, anxiety etc. The changes like social, psychological & biological affect the dual roles of working women.
- Wentling (2003) showed that dual responsibilities of woman become burden to her and became reason of stress, tension and sometime conflict due to social structure which is still more dominant.
- Dr. Rinku Rani (2013) viewed that working women especially working married women face more problems in our daily life. Working married women play dual role in our life. They have no time for her children and her husband lack of time family become reason of her marital adjustment.
- GobalaKrishna and Gandhi (2013) in their study "Working women and their problems in daily life: A Sociological analysis" conducted survey on working women of college a Tiruvannamalai district to find the major problems. Most of 72 percent of respondent is living in joint family and their economic

condition of family is not good that's why they go for work but nobody support her and working women always showing problems like anxiety, depression in their life.

- Balaji, (2014) says that both family and work have impact on the family domain, mostly we see negative impact on family and conflict occur in family work and job work because family and work both are demanding equal time and energy. As a result greater conflict occurs in family.
- Dashora(2013)in the study of 'problems faced by working women in India showed that different-different types of problem faced by working women in India .women face sexual harassment at the workplace and boss attribute to sexual favors are the major problem which lead to psychological major pressure to women and that's why sometime women is no able to continue her job.
- Majumdar.M(2004)women have different positions before marriage like she is daughter and sister of someone but after marriage she had become wife, mother and after marriage many more responsibilities come and working women problems start occurring more.

### Problems faced by working women

**Problems of responsibility of the family**: Full time working women still do a second shift at home and they have less free time to take care of their children's they face some problems basically in relation to family support to participate in income earning activities outside.

Threat of Removal from Job: In the Indian content majority of women go for work not for fun but out of necessity. Some are compelled to work because of poor family conditions. Employers who are aware of helplessness of these female employers exploit them in all the possible ways.

Women are working more work: Women normally work with Insufficient maternity leaves: Insufficient maternity leave is also main problem faced by working women. Thus is not only affects the performance of woman employees at work but also affected the women personal lives.

Women are given more work: Women normally work with devotion, seriousness & sincerity. This commitment to work is providing to a big disadvantage for them. Hence every time they are giving more work which is not duty rewarded.

Women as victims of violence: Violence against women is not a new phenomenon in Indian crime against women rape, harassment; various types of violence including women face violence at workplace also.

Health problems: Studies have revealed that women themselves are neglecting their own health. Normally Indian Women consume less food & spend more energy on work. Working women have dual work & they have no time to take proper diet. They have to do official work, household work, taking care of children & will have to several needs of her husband. It starts to affect her health. Problems of mental tension, blood pressures etc are some of the problems which are faced by her.

Gender Discrimination in occupation: Gender disparity exists India .Being born as women in Indian society, one has to face gender discrimination at all levels. Women of color may experience discrimination at the workplace differently from a white female co-worker.
