Introduction


Research Design: The researcher used a survey method to conduct descriptive research.

Research Method: The researcher used a survey method for this study.




Sample -In this study, the sample consists of 30 teachers residing in the Mumbai region.








the government and the other agencies, schools, etc.) are adequately spreading awareness about women's empowerment and its need in society.





India has somewhere lost what the concept of equality is all about 30 responses





Women empowerment will lead to westernisation of India 30 responses





